


Which Candidate Is Better On Health Care?




Given what you know about the health reform law, do you have a generally <u>favorable</u> or generally <u>unfavorable</u> opinion of it?







FIGURE 1: DISCUSSION OF HEALTH CARE IN FEDERAL AD AIRINGS, 2008-2018




Majorities Across Partisans Say Lowering Costs And Maintaining Pre-Existing Protections Should Be Top Priorities For Congress



Would you favor or oppose a national Medicare-for-all plan if you heard that it would do the following?




Half Of Adults Report Putting Off Care Due To Costs; Some Say Their Conditions Got Worse As A Result Of Skipping Care

Percent who say they or a family member living in their household did each of the following in the past 12 months because of the cost:






Premiums and Deductibles Rise Faster than Worker's Wages Over Past Decade





How Issues Affect Swing Voters' Choices for 2020 Presidential Candidates

In the most recent KFF tracking polls, 30% of voters are "swing voters."



NOTE: Swing voters are voters who report they have not decided on whether they plan to vote for President Trump or the Democratic nominee in the 2020 elections. Numbers indicate the percentage point difference in the share of swing voters who say each issue makes them more likely to support either President Trump or the Democratic nominee.
